Calling of the Disciples

Mark 1:14-20; Luke 5:1-11; John 1:25-51

LESSON FOCUS

"Come, be my disciples, and I will show you how to fish for people!" Mark 1:17

In the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) we read of the circumstances in which Jesus called His disciples. We see Jesus preaching by the seashore and selecting four of the fishermen to become His first disciples to learn under His guidance how to become "fishers of men." (Matthew 4:19). They were to turn all the practical knowledge and skill they knew in fishing into the work of bringing people into God's kingdom.

It is interesting to note Jesus' call to some of His disciples. Simon and Andrew were virtually in the middle of their work, casting a net into the lake, perhaps thinking about drying the fish that had been caught or nets that needed repair. But as the net flew out over the water, they heard someone calling their names. It was Jesus. He called busy and successful people to follow Him. Mark 1:18 says "at once they left their nets and followed him. The One who called them was worthy of their eager obedience! Jesus called them to know Him, to make Him the core of their daily lives and to live as He lived.

Mark 3:13-19 gives the account of Jesus appointing the 12 disciples. Verse 14 tells why Jesus chose these men: "that they might be with him." This is what Jesus wants from us today – to take the time to be in His presence.

Jesus called Peter and these other men to be preachers and teachers of God's Word. He wanted them to concentrate on bringing the saving Gospel to people so God could gather them into His kingdom. That would be their full-time calling for life. Throughout history, God has continued to call certain individuals (both men and women) to full time service to Him as pastors and teachers. God provides the call, the gifts, and the results of the work. What a joy and privilege it is for a person to serve in this way for an entire lifetime, telling others of Jesus, their Savior. Every believer should consider carefully whether God has called him or her to serve Him as a public teacher or preacher.

BIBLE STORY

Call of the Disciples Luke 5:1-11; 6:12-16

Read from your Bible. Ask students to find it in a Bible too. Those that can read can follow along. Choose the passages you would like to read aloud. Use visuals to help tell the story.

"Come, be my disciples, and I will show you how to fish for people!" Mark 1:17

Jesus often traveled from town to town, telling people God's Word. He knew how important it was for people to know that He was their Savior, whom God the Father had sent. Jesus came to take away our sin.

Everywhere Jesus traveled, big crowds of people gathered to hear Him. In today's story, Jesus was preaching beside a big lake. People were crowding closer and closer, trying to see and hear Jesus. It must have been hard to hear Jesus with so many people crowding around Him.

Some of Jesus' disciples were fishermen. Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John had their boats at the edge of the lake and were cleaning their nets. Jesus got into one boat and asked Simon to row Him a short way out into the lake.

Now everyone could sit down on the shore and see and hear Jesus easily. Jesus preached to them from the boat. He has always wanted everyone to know that He is God's Son and their Savior.

When Jesus was finished preaching, He said to Simon, "Row out into the deep water and put your net into the water to catch fish." Simon said, "Master, we have fished all night and haven't caught anything, but I will obey Your word and let down the net."

When Simon and Andrew put their nets into the water, they caught so many fish that their nets were breaking. They called to their friends in the other boat to help them. They filled both boats so full that their boats began to sink. Everyone was amazed to catch so many fish! Simon Peter realized that Jesus helped them catch so many fish because He is God. Simon also knew that he was a sinner and God doesn't like sin. He said, "Go away from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord."

Jesus wanted Simon and the other disciples to know that He forgives our sin. He said, "Do not be afraid. Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men."

So Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John left their boats and everything they had and followed Jesus.

On another day Jesus knew it was time to choose all 12 disciples. Jesus had many followers, but only 12 would be chosen to be Disciples. Since this was such an important decision, He prayed all night to His Heavenly Father.

In the morning, Jesus called all His disciples together. From them, He chose to be His disciples: Simon, whom He also named Peter, and Andrew his brother; James and John; Philip and Bartholomew; Matthew and Thomas; James, the son of Alphaeus, and Simon called the Zealot; Judas, the son of James; and Judas Iscariot who would later betray Him.

These men followed Jesus for several years, they heard His message and saw His miracles. They saw Jesus die on the cross and rise again. Jesus wanted them to go and tell others all about Jesus, the world's Savior.

Dear Jesus, thank You so much for directing someone to tell me about You so I can know You as my Savior. Help me to tell other people about You. Help me to remember that You are always with me, helping me to tell others the good news about You. Amen.

BIBLE CHALLENGE

Read this passage from your Bible. Ask students to locate it in a Bible too. Help them learn this verse.

“Come, be my disciples, and I will show you how to fish for people!” Mark 1:17

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Activity Pages – make copies of the activity pages, use markers or colored pencils to complete the pages.

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GAMES

Game 1: Disciples Tag

This is almost like a regular game of tag except that as the person who is “it” tags someone, they both continue tagging. As others are tagged, they also help tag others until all are tagged. No one is tagged “out” in this game.

Use this as an opportunity to talk about how we don’t just tell one person about Jesus. We are to continue sharing the good news of Jesus.

Play “Balloon Volleyball.”

You’ll need a balloon for the game (a few extras in case one pops)

String to create a volleyball net on 2-3 feet above the floor

Divide your space with a string, strung 2-3 feet above the floor.

Divide students into two equal groups.


Teams will sit on each side of the net, whole teams will play. Make sure smaller students are at the front of the playing area so they get “ball time”.

Place the balloon volleyball into play by having students share one word of the verse every time the balloon is hit. Points are scored when opponents fail to say the following word in today’s verse. ***“Come, be my disciples, and I will show you how to fish for people!”*** Mark 1:17

Repeat as many times as needed.

SCIENCE ACTIVITY

Experiment 1: Jesus Calls His Disciples



Experiment Basics:

When Jesus called His disciples, they were amazed and filled with joy. This experiment can be done by each student. A balloon on a bottle is blown up, showing how this joy fills our lives and overflows to others around us.

Materials Needed:

Empty water bottle, one per student (can be re-used for each group)

Small round balloons

Balloon inflator to inflate and let out the balloons ahead of time so they are already stretched

Baking Soda

A small plastic funnel

A teaspoon

Vinegar

Container to pour contents of bottles out to prepare for next group

Garbage container for used balloons

Preparation:

Blow up several balloons before hand to stretch it and practice slipping a balloon nozzle over the neck of the water bottle.

Put the funnel into a dry cold-drink bottle and add four teaspoons of Baking Soda into the bottle. You may need more depending on the bottle so experiment with the amount needed beforehand. Remove the funnel and pour about 200 ml of clear Vinegar into the bottle and quickly slip the balloon nozzle over the neck of the bottle. The Baking Soda reacts with the Vinegar to make Carbon Dioxide gas and this will blow up the balloon!

Jesus never said that following Him would be easy. In fact, He already knew that He would die on the cross. His followers didn't ask how much money they would get or if they would become famous. They followed Jesus because they knew it was the right thing to do. Ask the following questions:

1. Where did Jesus go when He began preaching? (Galilee)
2. Who were the first two men Jesus called to follow Him? (Andrew and Simon) And the next two brothers? (James and John)
3. What did these men do when Jesus called them? (They left their nets and boats and followed Him.)
4. Why did Jesus choose fishermen to follow Him? (He was looking at their hearts and knew they had a lot of faith.)
