Problems to Possibilities

It was a real heaven-invading-my-life morning. And I wasn't even expecting it. In fact, I wasn't even aware of the deep rut that I was forging within the confines of my office.

This week's problems were ricocheting within my brain. "What should I do? How should I solve this problem? Should I say something or remain quiet?"

One knock at the door was about to cause a 180-degree attitude change in my life, and I was clueless.

"Ready to brainstorm?" asked Steve. "We are starting on our next sermon series and need your input."

Within seconds, I was in Pastor Burcham's office being briefed about the upcoming sermon series.

"Here is what I am thinking: A practical sermon series that will help us when we face problems. Instead of focusing on, or ignoring the problem, why not change our focus onto God, who can change the problem into a grand possibility," said Pastor Burcham.

Oh no, my current brain war was exposed. I have been caught in my tangled web of misery and heaven's light just illuminated my dark ruts.

Give this problem to God? Look unto God? Instead of focusing on life's dirt, why not focus on the deliverer? The aha moments continued. Isn't that what God has done throughout the centuries? Hasn't God always tried to help our inabilities to deal with every aspect of life from a crisis to our daily bread issues? Hasn't our incompetence been overshadowed by God's competence?

Take, for example, the captive Israelites in Egypt. With no relief in sight, the Israelites prayed and God created solutions that they could not even dream about. He provided a way out of slavery by parting the Red Sea, manna to eat, and water to drink, a cloud to help shade them during the day, and a pillar of fire by night to help them see. God

is the author of creative solutions. He is on our side and all we have to do is allow him to work.

If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? Romans 8:31b-32

As I left the office that day, I still had the same problem, but my attitude changed once I realized that God is bigger than my current predicament, and that he wants to be in the mix of my heart's dilemmas. I can walk more confidently knowing that he is with me.

As we approach this four-week sermon series, "Problems to Possibilities," my prayer is that my incident is small compared with what will happen to each of our lives as we turn each difficulty over to the capable and caring hands of the Creator of the Universe.

Uganda from Two Team Member's Perspectives

Ten days ago, the team from Uganda returned to Gloria Dei. We thought you would enjoy the insights from two of our team members, Jennifer Simpson and Stan Greenwood. Jennifer is a sales director over Learfield New's Radio Iowa Division and assisted leading vocals for the worship conference. Stan is a retired photography instructor and played bass and was the photojournalist for the conference.

Jennifer Simpson

What were your first impressions of Uganda?

I was amazed by how active everyone was no matter what time of day or night. There were always people on the street selling, walking, or shopping.

What were some of the cultural differences?

The family dynamic is strong and enforced from the top down; the siblings take care of each other financially and

emotionally until they become independent.

There was a lot of respect to history and tradition, which is somewhat lacking in the United States. I was asked, "What is your traditional wear?" and I had to stop and think that we truly don't have any form of traditional wear that is unique

to us. It was great to see so much history and respect.

When meeting the local churches, what were your impressions?

I was impressed with their dedication to their church communities and their pure love of Christ. They were so appreciative of the gifts God has given them even though their lives are not padded with lots of material items. There was a lot of structure to their services, so our gift of new music and education was sincerely appreciated and useful for spreading the word to the youth.

Please name one incident that really impressed you.

An attendee named Angela drew me aside to teach me the Lugandan words to the chorus of "I Am Not Ashamed." She sat with me for more than 20 minutes repeating the words and singing alongside of me until I was able to master the newly-learned words. While I was learning the words, the rest of our team heard what was going on, and we had everyone singing Lugandan by the end of the conference. It was something I will never forget!

Any other thoughts?

My wish would be to bottle up the energy, power, dedication and desire from the Ugandan congregations and infuse it into our worship at Gloria Dei.

Stan Greenwood

What were your first impressions of Uganda?

The night ride from the airport and the number of cars, trucks, motorcycles, and pedestrians was overwhelming. People seem to spend much of their time outside.

What were some of the cultural differences?

Some of their living conditions are hard to imagine. There is a very wide gap between the rich and the poor. There is less opportunity to advance in Uganda, for example, there are no student loans.

Tell me about the food and accommodations?

I thought the food was interesting and I enjoyed trying different things. Often we would have goat, rice, potatoes, stew, and fruit. The pineapple was the best I have ever tasted.

We stayed with Charles, the pastor at the Kampala church. Other than adjusting to the cold showers and the electricity outages every other day, it was a nice place to stay. Charles and the others were wonderful hosts.

The conference was the best part of the trip. To worship, sing and praise God with the Christians in Uganda was something I will always remember.

Any other thoughts?

The needs of the Lutheran church in Uganda are many. I hope we, as a congregation, are able to direct our efforts to help them in ways that will enhance and expand their abilities to spread the gospel.




