Lead Us Not Into Temptation

Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.

In the next two weeks, we will examine these two petitions from the Lord's Prayer that deal with the darker side of life, temptation and evil.

The scriptures declare that God is all good and that evil comes from Lucifer, the devil, the enemy of God and our souls. This wicked foe is characterized as a lion prowling around seeking to pounce on a victim, i.e., you and me. His main mission is mere destruction.

The thief comes only to steal, kill and to destroy. John 10:10

His methods are not as obvious though, for his slyness and deception catch many great men and women off guard as he weaves his evil web around them, capturing them with his slimy, sticky tentacles, suffocating his victims from hope and life.

It is no wonder why the petitions concerning temptations and evil are sandwiched into the Lord's Prayer—we need help to fight this ferocious foe.

But what does it mean to lead us not into temptation? Isn't temptation inevitable? Wasn't the Lord tempted? Doesn't the Bible teach that we should consider it pure joy when we face trials and temptations? If it is so wonderful, why avoid such pitfalls?

Perhaps the answer lies within the tiny preposition *into*, which means entry; not to be interchanged with *unto*, which literally means to. Let me explain: In the garden of Gethsemane when the Lord bades his disciples to "watch and pray, that they enter not into temptation," it is not a prayer of *avoidance* from temptation, but rather a prayer of *overcoming* the

For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever, Amen.

temptation. In his final hours on earth, the Lord surely understood that darkness would encroach upon the disciples. He wasn't telling them to skip town to avoid the temptation; instead he was instructing them not to become immersed in the temptation. In other words, they will approach the walls of temptations, but they do not have to make camp and live there.

For example, a person whose weakness is to drink cannot escape alcohol for it is common in stores, bars and restaurants. It would be futile for the man to pray for the Lord to lead him away from that temptation. It would be possible, though,

for this man to pray that he does not participate in his temptation. And each time, God's power enables him to withstand the temptation, God is glorified and the man is strengthened.

We cannot avoid temptations, for we live in a fallen world with a worthy opponent that wants our very breath, but we can pray for God to help us with his strength so that we may resist and not be drawn into the snare of the lion.

Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the body is weak. Mark 14:38
