The Third Sunday after Pentecost

One Father's Example

Everybody likes to get their own way. It seems to be an important part of the human equation. Self equals getting what you want, which equates to self-satisfaction. After all, it is all about us, isn't it?

The Lord very succinctly teaches us in the Lord's Prayer that it's not about us, it is about him.

Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Fourteen simple words—fourteen words that completely place God in a divine perspective without even a hint of help from us. In fact, self is not even included in this phrase. But if you haven't noticed, self does not like to take its proper seat in the hierarchy of God's kingdom. Thankfully God has left us with vivid snapshots of men and women in the Bible who understood God's chain of command.

Since it is Father's Day, let's pick on the biblical father of believing, Abraham. At the age of 75, God called Abraham to leave his homeland and to travel to an unknown place. An undesirable retirement package for most people, and yet it appears that Abraham didn't even throw the "why me?" or the "you gotta be kidding" phrases to the Lord. Instead he simply heeded God's instructions, packed up camp and left.

As we continue with Abraham's life, we see a lifestyle of a man whose heart yielded to God in the midst of complexity and adversity. Take, for example this unusual altar call from God:

Then God said, "Take your son, your only son, Isaac, whom you love, and go to the region of Moriah. Sacrifice him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains I will tell you about." Genesis 22:2

With knife in hand, Abraham followed God's instruction and placed Isaac on the altar to slay him. Fortunately, the angel of the Lord called a stop to this action.

But the angel of the LORD called out to him from heaven, "Abraham! Abraham!"

"Here I am," he replied. "Do not lay a hand on the boy," he said. "Do not do anything to him. Now I know that you fear God, because you have not withheld from me your son, your only son." Genesis 22:11-12

God was pleased with Abraham's desire to obey despite the cost. In the epistles, God praises Abraham's long list of believing.

Yet he did not waver through unbelief regarding the promise of God, but was strengthened in his faith and gave glory to God, being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised. Romans 4:20-21

Abraham got the message; he understood that God's power was the ultimate rule. This father of believing did something that the Lord asks us to do: deny ourselves and center on God's will being done on earth as it is heaven.

"I am looking forward to working with the people and helping the church," said Mark.



"I am looking forward to the opportunity to help Gloria Dei move into the future," said Marv.




Thrivent Builds with Habitat for Humanity


Building in Progress

People's Republic of China, the largest country in East Asia with over 1.31 billion people has been ruled by the Community Party of China since the state's establishment in 1949. Its vast population and growing economy continue to strengthen its base as a superpower. Some regions within the country are progressive, with major universities and all the amenities that we are accustomed to in America. However, many of the mountainous regions and remote areas are lacking provisions to sustain daily life, such as electricity, running water, adequate food and shelter. The majority of Chinese identify themselves as non-religious, although some lean toward Confucianism, Taoism, Buddhism, Islam and Christianity. Christianity is allowed under some conditions, and watched carefully under all circumstances.

It is in this background that Gloria Dei decided to help support a project in a remote area of China. Members from Gloria Dei have been involved in China for several years: Scott Raecker, Dan and Deb Timmons, and Brad Peyton have supported various projects through a non-profit organization named Shining City Foundation. Through their connections, they have a personal relationship with individuals whose lives are dedicated to helping the impoverished Chinese. Shining City Foundation has undertaken a project to build a church/community center in a remote area to help host and house the hundreds of worshippers who often visit. These journeys are unlike anything we have ever experienced in Iowa. Men, women and children risk their lives to travel over rocky terrain, raging rivers and inclement weather to worship. A building will not only provide a safe place to worship, but will also be a place for travelers to spend the night before returning home across the rugged terrain. The church will be built with the authorization and cooperation of local authorities.

Members of Gloria Dei have provided \$12,000 to begin this project; Gloria Dei plans to give an additional \$7,000 to complete it. The project has broken ground and should to be completed before year-end.

Scott Raecker, who has been involved in the effort in China for many years, reflects on his experiences:

"What excites me the most about our

work in China has been that through our humanitarian efforts we have really been able to put our faith into action enhancing the lives of others," said Scott. "We have re-built orphanage schools, established self-sustaining farm operations, built and supplied medical/dental clinics, brought electricity to those who have never had it, and provided scholarship funds to educate over 300

youth. In doing so, we have opened the door for local villagers in remote areas to meet Jesus for the first time. These villagers have grown in their faith and received approval from local officials to build their own church. Our support

will allow this wonderful facility to come to life. These villagers will walk as long as three days in order to spend several days in worship. They will now


> move their worship from a dirt-floored barn to a church that appropriately celebrates the gifts of God.

"In addition, our efforts in China have enhanced my own spiritual life. I have a deeper relationship with God and have found that the more you give the more you receive in return. Matthew 5:16 tells us to let our light shine before men, that they may see our good works,

and glorify our Father which is in heaven. Our efforts through Gloria Dei are certainly shining the light of our Lord and Savior," said Scott.
