Starting the Conversation

If everyone was like me, it would be easy to reach them. Conversations would revolve around my likes, dislikes, passions and beliefs. Of course, I would talk about art, photography, books, biking, my disdain for eggs, and my love for God. Unfortunately, not many people fit into that demographic mold; neither do they fit into your unique mold. So, what do we do when we want to share the gospel with people who are different than us? And how about those people who completely oppose everything we believe in? Or who deny the name of Jesus Christ?

How can we reach people who are different than ourselves?

Paul sets a great example of how to approach this dilemma when he reveals his heart in I Corinthians 9:22:

To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some.

Deep down in Paul's heart was a desire to reach people with the life-saving message of Jesus. He understood that in order to reach people, he would have to relate to them in a loving and genuine way. Take how he handled the idolatry found in Athens in Acts 17. Paul could have walked away or belittled their beliefs, instead he began a conversation concerning one of their common icons of the day—an idol labeled "unknown God."

For as I walked around and looked carefully at your objects of worship, I even found an altar with this inscription: TO AN UNKNOWN GOD. Now what you worship as something unknown I am going to proclaim to you. Acts 17:23

Paul intentionally placed himself in the midst of a situation that required insight, empathy, and understanding of the people that he wanted to reach. Shouldn't we do the same?

This week let's look around at the people surrounding us. More than likely, their beliefs will be different than ours. But let's see if we can imitate Paul by lovingly finding a common point that could possibly point to the lover of all mankind, Jesus.

Strategic Plan Updates

Over the past several months, the Strategic Planning MAT and its four topical focus groups have been working hard to implement the components of the recently ratified Strategic Plan. The facilities focus group is tasked with exploring sites that may be suitable for relocation. The decision was made to involve an architectural firm in the earliest stages—including establishing a set of criteria for selecting potential sites and then identifying parcels of land that would successfully meet the parameters set forth.

After issuing a "Request for Proposals" to 11 firms, the focus group reviewed the nine proposals they received, narrowing the field to three firms. Each of the three firms was invited for an extensive interview where they described how they would be helpful in the many steps along the way to achieving our end goal. After extensive review, the focus group's top choice was SVPA Architect, Inc., a well-established local firm since 1953.

SVPA is not a stranger to Gloria Dei—they assisted in the building of the Family Life Center, the educational wing and the parking lot improvements. But our past working experience with them was only a portion of why the focus group chose SVPA. Their extensive experience in worship facility design, effective programming methodology (need identification, analysis and prioritization), and the high recommendations from references made the decision clear.

"We are excited and confident about our selection," said Merlin Siefken, facility focus group leader. "We firmly believe that SVPA is the right choice to help us accomplish a large component of the Strategic Plan."

As we begin our journey with this architectural firm, we will keep you informed of the progress, the thought processes and other important updates as they occur.

The Basic Core Beliefs of Mormonism

In an effort to understand Mormonism and its impact on today's society, we have composed a summary of their basic beliefs.

History

Mormonism is an ancient religion that was restored in the early 1800s. Mormonism is an unofficial name used to refer to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (also called The Mormon Church). Mormonism refers to the doctrines taught by Joseph Smith and the succeeding prophets and leaders of the church, but those doctrines are believed to be eternal and part of the original gospel preached by Jesus Christ. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is the fourth largest Christian denomination in the United States. The church is headquartered in Salt Lake City, Utah, and has established congregations and temples worldwide, reporting approximately 13 million members.

Central Belief

Mormonism is defined as a branch of Christianity, encompassing numerous religious denominations, but is generally associated with the theology and subculture of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Belief in Deity

The term "Mormon" derives from "The Book of Mormon," which was published in 1830 and recently subtitled "Another Testament of Jesus Christ" to highlight the importance of the information about the Savior that is contained in the book. The Book of Mormon is accepted by the LDS as scripture along with the Bible.



Mormons believe Christ visited the Americas after his resurrection.

Concept of Sin

The concept of sin is down-played. Sin is evil because of what it does to the person, not because of what it does to God. If sin can be rationalized into something else, it is no longer a sin. Five major sins of Mormonism are murder, apostasy, sexual immorality, breaking the Word of Wisdom and refusal to bear children.

Salvation

Mormonism diminishes the role Jesus played in providing eternal life and teaches that Christ's atoning sacrifice results in physical resurrection thus 'opening the door' to eternal life. The word atone is seen as meaning 'at-one' with God, not 'to make amends.'

Religious Practice

In Mormonism, faith is twofold: acceptance of the Mormon plan of salvation through works, rather than of salvation itself and the power God gives to resist sin and perform works, thereby working the plan to become perfect and saving oneself. The power of faith is bestowed in proportion to the righteousness one demonstrates through obedience to God's laws.

After Death

Justification and sanctification must be earned through life-long obedience and working to fulfill all requirements. After Mormons spend this life and the next spiritual life striving to "do all they can do," if they were good enough, Jesus makes up the difference and grants them eternal life. Mormons cannot be sure of their eternal fate, because it is based on what they have yet to do.

As reported a few weeks ago, the team from Gloria Dei experienced many great things during their recent trip to Honduras. In an effort to educate all of us about the great need in Honduras, we have composed the following article:

Honduras is the third poorest country in Latin America and the second poorest country in Central America. Although the government has achieved a degree of economic stability since 2000, it has not improved living conditions or reduced poverty for the country's huge proportion of poor people. Poverty levels have remained essentially unchanged since 1997. The population is evenly divided between urban and rural areas, but poverty is essentially a rural problem. About 74 percent of the country's poor people, and 86 percent of the extremely poor, live in rural areas.

Who and where are Honduras' poor rural people?

The country's poor rural people include farmers, rural women, landless people and laborers, some of whom belong to ethnic and indigenous groups.

Women and indigenous groups are among the poorest people in Honduras. Women who are heads of households make up about 9 percent of the country's small farmers. They work long hours and bear the double burden of working the land and taking care of their families, in which there are an average of seven children. The income of households headed by women in hillside areas is about 30 percent less than that of households headed by men, and they receive less than half the level of government transfers. As many as 70 percent of rural women are illiterate, and only 20 percent have had secondary level schooling.

Honduras has nine recognized indigenous and African American minority groups comprising about 70,000 families, or about 6.5 percent of the population. Communities of indigenous origin include small subsistence farmers and temporary rural workers. Many of them are landless. Indigenous peoples have substantially higher poverty rates. An estimated 71 percent of indigenous people live below the poverty line.

Poverty is prevalent in central hillside areas in the interior highlands of Honduras, which are home to about 75 percent of the rural population, including indigenous groups. The highest concentration of rural poverty is found in the western region, which also has the greatest concentration of extreme poverty.

Why are they poor?

Lack of access to land, together with fragile social conditions, a vulnerable environment and low agricultural productivity are among the problems at the root of poverty in the country.

The country is prone to hurricanes and flooding, particularly in the areas close to the Caribbean coast. Hurricane Mitch, which hit Honduras in late 1998, caused widespread destruction of basic economic and social infrastructure, rural housing and food crops.

Please continue to pray for the people in Honduras.

Local Outreach Opportunity for Gloria Dei

Several months ago, Gloria Dei's Beacon of Blessing committee said a prayer asking our Lord to identify unique opportunities for our congregation to serve the community. One of the answers given loud and clear was Freedom for Youth Ministries, an organization that happened to be saying their own prayers in hopes of being led to a congregation like Gloria Dei.

To get a sense of Freedom for Youth Ministries, one needs only to read their mission and vision statements.

Mission: Freedom for Youth Ministries offers the love of Jesus Christ to homeless and at-risk youth which empowers them to break bondages of their lives, discover their God-given purpose and lead a life filled with faith, hope and love.

Vision: To unite the Christian community to reach out to our lost and hurting youth in Des Moines and empower them to demonstrate their love for Jesus through sharing their time and talents with the youth we serve.

A 6-acre area located in Des Moines' inner city, the Freedom Center Campus serves as a sanctuary for teens and young adults to learn news skills (ranging from woodworking and welding to music and dance), enjoy a meal and be encouraged through the scriptures. The organization's Promise House offers a Christ-based transitional housing program for young men ages 18-22 (a similar program for young women is in design). And this fall, Whiz Kids will be introduced for 6- to 12-year-olds providing an opportunity for mentors to read, feed and invest in the lives of dozens of children

Turning to the Christian Community

Being firmly based in Christian ministry, Freedom for Youth Ministry receives little or no support from government entities and the general Des Moines business community. Success centers on the prayers and support of local churches, bible study and youth groups, and individuals.

So how can Gloria Dei help? The organization has identified the following opportunities for consideration:

Small groups willing to serve a hot meal once a month throughout the school year. The biggest needs are a specific Monday (1st, 2nd, etc.) for the 6- to 12-year-olds and a specific Saturday for the teens.

Mentors for the 6- to 12-year-olds who would each be committed to a student for a school year and responsible for transporting them to and from campus (with another mentor), reading with them for 45 minutes, enjoying a devotional time and dinner. This commitment would be roughly 1.5 hours a week.

Groups willing to do an afternoon of manual labor to help improve the campus.

Communion

Communion is offered on the first and third Sundays of each month during the services in the Sanctuary and the second and fourth Saturdays during the services in the Family Life Center.
